



Explanation

1) I believe that full disclosure should be made by the lobbyist and by the candidate/office holder for any gifts or money donated by a registered lobbyist. I believe that all lobbyists should be duly registered. However, I feel that lobbyists just like any other member of a particular profession should be able to make political contributions. I feel that prohibiting lobbyists from making political contributions is an infringement on their free speech. I further believe that such a prohibition is a very slippery slope.
